



# KIRKTON SOLAR PHOTOVOLTAIC (PV) AND ENERGY STORAGE FACILITY

**Pre-Application Consultation (PAC) Report** 



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# 1 INTRODUCTION

### 1.1 Context

Elgin Energy Esco Ltd, hereby referred to as the 'Applicant' has undertaken a voluntary period of preapplication consultation (PAC) prior to submitting an application for consent to the Scottish Government Energy Consents Unit (ECU). This application seeks consent under Section 36 of the Electricity Act 1989 to construct and operate the following development on lands approximately 1.2km southeast of St.Fergus Village, Peterhead, directly east of the A90:

"Proposed construction and operation of an electricity generating station with installed capacity in excess of 50megawatts (MW) consisting of a solar PV farm of approximately 50MW capacity and a batteryn energy storage facility of approximately 20MW capacity, with ancillary development."

Under the terms of the Electricity Act application process, there is no mandatory obligation to consult with members of the public prior to submitting the application for consent. However, in accordance with Elgin Energy's internal methods of best practice, a programme of pre-application community engagement has been undertaken by the Applicant, which is broadly based on the consultation principles outlined in the Town and Country Planning (Development Management Procedure)(Scotland) 2013, Planning Circular 2013, and the Town and Country Planning (Miscellaneous Temporary Modifications) (Coronavirus) (Scotland) Regulations 2020. The Applicant appreciates the benefits of effective engagement with stakeholders in the local community, in helping to guide and inform the iterative design process, identify planning and environmental issues, develop relationships, and increase levels of transparency.

This Pre-Application Consultation report (PACR) summarises the consultation approach taken over an 8 week period and the feedback received during the PAC process, and outlines how this has been addressed through this comprehensive planning submission.



# 1.1.1 Application Site

The application site is located approximately 1km outside the village of St Fergus, in Kirkton, Peterhead and incorporates a large swathe of agricultural lands which span an area of approximately 112.7 hectares (c. 278 acres). The proposed development within the application site/developable area will span circa 76.5 hectares / 188 acres which equates to approximately 67% of the site. The reduced area includes the significant spacing between panel arrays but excludes other areas within the red line which are free from infrastructure. Access onto the site will be taken from existing access lanes onto the A90 along the western side of the site. The application site is shown opposite at Figure 1.1 for reference purposes.





# 1.1.2 Proposed Development

The application to the ECU as set out in Section 1.1 above, seeks consent for the "Proposed construction and operation of an electricity generating station with installed capacity in excess of 50 megawatts (MW) consisting of a solar PV farm of approximately 50MW capacity and a battery energy storage facility of approximately 20MW capacity, with ancillary development."

The battery storage facility will comprise approximately 10 storage units typically measuring 12.2m (I)  $\times$  2.4(w)  $\times$  2.6m (h). It is proposed to locate the facility beside the proposed Primary Substation near to the southern site boundary.

In terms of other elements, the scheme will comprise: -

- Photovoltaic (PV) Solar Panels erected on steel or aluminium frames;
- 1 on-site Primary Substation as referred to typically measuring 6m (I) x 3.2 (w) x 3.4m (h);
- 50 No. Inverter Substations typically measuring 7m (I) x 2.5(w) x 3m (h) to be located across
  the site. These stations are connected to the panels by underground underground cabling. The
  stations convert the Direct Current (DC) electricity generated by the solar panels into Alternating
  Current (AC) electricity before being fed into the primary substation and then onward to the local
  electricity grid network;
- Perimeter post and wire "deer" fencing (2.45m high);
- A number of strategically located CCTV security cameras (3m high);
- Access via an existing and improved lane onto the A90 Road to the immediate west of the site;
- Landscape screening/planting; and



Associated internal service tracks.

# 1.2 Purpose of this Report

This PAC report describes the approach to pre-application consultation undertaken by RPS and Elgin, explaining the methods of engagement used for consulting with the local community, how these were broadly consistent with the temporary Scottish legislation with respect to Pre-Application Consultation and reflective of best practice outlined within Scottish Government guidance, and provides a summary of the feedback received. The report provides the ECU with a comprehensive review of the pre-application consultation process as a whole and is structured as follows: -

- description of temporary legislation and best practice;
- explanation of the approach to the pre-application consultation;
- detailing the pre-application process that was undertaken; and
- stakeholder feedback to the PAC.



# 2 PRE-APPLICATION CONSULTATION LEGISLATION AND BEST PRACTICE GUIDANCE

Elgin is committed to engaging with the local community and have done so in the spirit of the legislation and best practice guidance outlined below.

# 2.1 Consultation Guidance and Emergency Provisions

As noted previously, the pre-application consultation process undertaken by Elgin has been influenced by the requirements set out in the Town and Country Planning (Development Management Procedure)(Scotland) 2013, Planning Circular 2013, and the Town and Country Planning (Miscellaneous Temporary Modifications) (Coronavirus) (Scotland) Regulations 2020.

More specifically, the Scottish Government Guidance document 'Planning Advice Note 3/2010: community engagement' provided guidance on a strategy to direct the consultation process with local communities. Paragraph 64 of the guidance states that "The National Standards below have been applied to the planning system and are ideally suited for use by planning authorities for development plan preparation, by prospective applicants in pre-application consultations with communities and by people and communities in engaging on planning issues."

The National Standards highlight that "Effective community engagement requires the use of a variety of methods and the choice of method and the people involved will vary and it is impossible to set methods for every circumstance." This is particularly pertinent, given the current circumstances surrounding the current COVID-19 pandemic, and careful consideration was given to ensuring the methods of engagement captured feedback from hard-to-reach groups within the vicinity of the scheme and those with little or no internet access, to ensure maximum transparency. The guidance suggested various engagement mechanisms such as;

- Disseminating information via Community Councils and other networks;
- Use of e-participation/e-planning systems interactive plans and applications online;
- Using the media to raise awareness newspaper adverts/articles/radio; and
- Distributing information, for example postcards, leaflets, brochures, easy read guides and mail shots to postcode area.

In respect of the requirement to hold a public event, the Scottish Government released the 'Coronavirus (COVID-19): planning guidance on pre-application consultations for public events' guidance document, temporarily suspending the requirement that public events formed part of PAC processes. The Guidance document stipulates that: -

"The intention is to find alternative ways to enable the exchange of views that would otherwise be achieved by face to face interaction. That is, it is not considered sufficient for alternative consultation to allow only 'one way traffic', with those submitting views not seeing a response until the application itself is made with a PAC report.

This guidance advocated the use of the following alternatives to holding a public event, including:

- Information hosted in a central, free and publicly accessible web location; and
- Live and interactive web-based consultation, with online opportunities for the public to engage via a live Q&A and / or opportunities to make comment and receive feedback throughout the process.



# 3 THE APPROACH TO PRE-APPLICATION CONSULTATION

Based upon the best practice guidance, the PAC strategy was developed on the basis of the following principles: -

- Community Engagement must be meaningful and proportionate;
- It should seek to enhance the applicant's understanding of the local communities who may be affected by the application;
- Community Engagement must be timed to ensure that proposals are sufficiently developed to allow for meaningful comment but not so detailed that flexibility to amend the proposal has diminished;
- It is essential for people or interest groups to get involved in the preparation of development plans as this is where decisions on the strategy, for growth or protection, are made.

The consultation approach incorporated the following engagement methods:

- 1. Holding one-to-one pre-appe meetings with the ECU and the Local Planning Authority;
- 2. Identification of Key Stakeholder(s) groups and Local Elected Representatives, informed by local knowledge, previous consultation exercises, Community Councils and local representatives, Fife Council Planning Authority, and ECU
- 3. Engagement via written correspondence with local elected representatives (including local Ward Councillors for Peterhead North and Rattray and the MSP for the area), offering an opportunity for direct discourse;
- 4. Issuing letters to request engagement from the Local Community Council within Aberdeenshire and subsequent appearance at their committee meeting;
- 5. Period of 8 week continuous engagement which included;
  - a. Creation of a project specific website, publicly accessible online providing information on the proposals and how additional information could be requested;
  - b. Advertisement of the proposed project website within local newspapers;
  - Undertaking letter drops to properties within c.1km of the proposed application site providing information on the proposal and directing to website where further information may be obtained;
  - Online survey facilitating feedback, providing a contact form and contact details of how members of the public could obtain further information or contact the development team for direct engagement; and
- 6. Direct engagement with local residents where requested.

RPS and Elgin engaged with the ECU and Aberdeenshire Council Planning Department during the following pre-appe meetings:

- Pre-Appe Meeting with Aberdeenshire Council Planning Department 5<sup>th</sup> November 2020; and
- Pre-Appe Meeting with ECU 13<sup>th</sup> January 2021; and
- Pre-Appe Meeting (2) with ECU 11<sup>th</sup> February 2021.

Discussion on PAC formed part of each of the aforementioned meetings.

Aberdeenshire Council provided valuable information relating to key stakeholders, including the relevant community council and Councillors, local newspapers for planning adverts, adjacent proposals, and potential issues for discussions.



# 4 PRE-APPLICATION COMMUNITY CONSULTATION

# 4.1 Stakeholders - Identifying who to consult

The Applicant and their consultant team prepared a stakeholder database based on the Applicant's knowledge of the site at Kirkton, the surrounding area, and on experience of similar projects to identify a list of primary stakeholders/community groups which should be targeted as part of the consultation process. This comprised mainly of local elected representatives, local residents within 1km of the site, and Community Councils.

Early liasion with Aberdeenshire Council's Planning Department helped direct the engagement process in terms of confirming the stakeholders to be consulted. RPS also discussed proposed engagement methods and sought advice from the Council that these were appropriate during the COVID-19 pandemic. Preengagement with the Council also facilitated a parallel process of engagement with technical Council bodies to provide feedback on the emerging proposals.

Whilst pre-application engagement with Aberdeenshire Council commenced in November 2020, engagement with the Buchan East Community Council, elected representatives and the local communities was undertaken during December 2020 and February 2021.

The stakeholder database was to be treated as a fluid document and constantly reviewed for the duration of the engagement period to ensure that other stakeholders who emerged through the process could be added to the database.

# 4.2 Method of Engagement

The consultation exercise was carried out in accordance with the guidance and National Standards which states that "developers should ensure appropriate and proportionate steps are taken to engage with communities". In this context, the Consultant team advised the Applicant on the methods and level of engagement which would be appropriate to the nature and scale of the application and which would ensure the consultation would be meaningful and effective.

The Development team engaged with the local community using the following methods: -

- Dedicated project information website live since the 4th January 2021;
- Press Notice;
- Letter drop to properties within the local area;
- Online survey to facilitate feedback which ran from 4<sup>th</sup> January until 29<sup>th</sup> January;
- Liaison with locally elected representatives for the area via letter, e-mail and digital meetings if requested;
- Engagement with local residents via direct written correspondence and phone-calls; and
- Liaison with Community Council.

This ensured that the project information was accessible to all sections of the community in a number of formats.

# 4.2.1 Digital Platform - Dedicated Website

A dedicated project website was developed by the Applicant to facilitate meaningful pre-application consultation. The website comprised dedicated online webpages with different tabs/sections providing the same information as would have been otherwise available at a public exhibition/public event. This included project information/drawings, images of the application site and proposed plans showing details on the nature and scale of the development. The website also provided an online survey questionnaire and clear information



on ways in which the development team could be contacted and how more information on the project could be obtained, as well as an FAQ section.

The website link is: <a href="www.kirktonsolarfarm.co.uk">www.kirktonsolarfarm.co.uk</a>. The website has been live to the public from 4th January 2021, allowing them to view the proposals, projected project timelines and further project information. A facility to provide feedback via the online form, and to engage with the project team directly also ran from 4th January to 29th January 2021. The website was readily accessible and was designed to be used by all stakeholder groups, using larger text and headings, with non-technical information, so that it was is easily navigable and easily understood. Screenshots of the webpages are included at Appendix 4 for information. The following information was provided:

- Scheme overview, benefits of the scheme, and information on the Applicant;
- Draft Planning drawings displaying information about the application site, the proposed development and viewpoints of the scheme (all were available to download);
- Potential impacts of the proposal including environmental issues being considered;
- A Survey facilitating feedback, comments and gueries;
- Copies of the information leaflet distributed to surrounding residents (refer Section 4.2.3 below) were made available and posted to any member of the public who wished to have the information in hard copy; and

In addition the website provided opportunities for direct contact with the project team through email or telephone to raise queries/concerns or to participate in a one-to-one discussion about the project.

The website was continually monitored during the period of active consultation, between 4<sup>th</sup> January and 29<sup>th</sup> January 2021. The number of views and downloads on the website was monitored to record 'attendance', made over the period between 4<sup>th</sup>-29th January 2021. The website remains live and continues to provide information to the public ahead of the planning application being submitted. The website has been updated accordingly as the project has progressed to submission stage.

# 4.2.2 Publicity

The pre-application consultation was advertised locally in those newspapers contained in Table 4.1 below.

A copy of the newspaper advertisements is provided at Appendix 1 for information. As evidenced, the Notice in the newspaper advised the community about:

- The description of, and the location of, the proposed development;
- The weblink to the webpage;
- Contact details of how members of the public could contact the development team; and
- Provided details of how anyone wishing to make comments relating to the proposal could do so.

The public notice clearly directs that any comments provided during the PAC process are not representations to the planning authority and do not affect the statutory right to make formal submissions to the ECU when the application for consent is submitted. This message was consistently attached to all publicity literature and project information during PAC.



## 4.2.3 Letter/Information leaflet distribution

As a further means of publicity, the local community were also notified about the consultation process through a letter/information leaflet distribution to all properties within the immediate vicinity (c.1km) of the proposed application boundary. The letters/information leaflet distribution was due to be carried out on 8<sup>th</sup> January 2021. However due to level 4 COVID-19 restrictions coming into effect in certain areas of Scotland including Aberdeenshire on 5<sup>th</sup> January 2021, a door-to-door distribution was prohibited and as such the cover letter/leaflets were delivered by post on 7<sup>th</sup> January 2021.

A cover letter accompanied the information leaflet which explained the purpose and nature of the consultation process, and how further information could be obtained. The letter also offered an opportunity for those with no access to the internet, to speak to the project team and obtain hard copies of the relevant documents. The project information leaflet provided information on the application site, the proposed scheme, details of the project website and contact details for members of the development design team.

The letter/information leaflet distribution was aimed at providing an alternative means of engagement for those living in the vicinity of the scheme who may have limited internet access or preferred not to engage digitally, to ensure they were fully aware of the proposals and could seek information by contacting the development design team directly. A copy of the letter and information leaflet issued to surrounding properties is included at Appendix 2.

During the course of the letter/information leaflet distribution, a discrepancy was noted on the project information leaflet regarding the project description. This discrepancy related to the wording of the description; "the proposed project covers approximately 260 acres and will accommodate approximately 35 megawatts (MW) of ground mounted solar photovoltaic (PV) panels and a 20MW energy storage facility". This discrepancy was amended on the project website and on the project information leaflet and an explanation of this error was noted on the Homepage of the project website (see figure 4.1 below).

# 4.2.4 Liaison with Community Council and Elected Representatives

A request for engagement letter was issued via email to local Councillors for the ward covering the application site, Peterhead North and Rattray, on 2<sup>nd</sup> December 2020. Further email correspondence was again issued in early January to confirm receipt. Further email exchanges with Councillors provided details of the project information website/information leaflet. The following Councillors were contacted: -

- Councillor Anne Allan (SNP);
- Councillor Dianne Beagrie (Conservative);
- · Councillor Alan Buchan (Independent) and
- Councillor lain Sutherland (Conservative)



Where no formal written confirmation of receipt was forthcoming, telephone contact was made and messages left with the respective Councillors where appropriate to ensure they received the issued information. Any feedback received is expanded upon in Section 5 of this report.

In addition to engaging with local Councillors, a request for engagement letter was issued to Mr Stewart Stevenson MSP in January 2021 and an email confirming receipt of the information was received on 25<sup>th</sup> January 2021.

The same request for engagement was also issued to the following local Community Council in December 2020: -

Buchan East Community Council

An email was received from the Secretary of Buchan East Community Council in January 2021 to request attendance at the Community Council's monthly meeting on 2<sup>nd</sup> February 2021.

Examples of the initial request for engagement correspondence issued to the above stakeholders is included at Appendix 3 for information.

# 4.2.5 Direct one-to-one emails and meetings with adjacent landowners and local residents

In addition to the above, direct engagement was undertaken with two property owners living directly adjacent to the proposed solar farm at Kirkton North and Kirkton South. As well as providing the project information contained in the information drop described in Section 4.2.3 above, the tailored correspondene also included direct telephone numbers and e-mail addresses for the Elgin and RPS project managers and an offer of phone/video calls to take place at the resident's convenience.

In addition to the above, a number of other local residents who became aware of the project during the consultation process also raised direct queries. Engagement took place via direct e-mail correspondence or where requested phone calls and online Microsft Teams meetings.

Further information in respect of this engagement process is provided in Section 5 below and Table 5.1.

# 4.2.6 Feedback

The website provided a conduit for online feedback and comments on the proposal with regard to:

- Whether the respondent supports the project in principle;
- What opinions/thoughts were on the project plans;
- Whether there is any aspect of the proposals that the respondent would wish to see changed;
- If there are any other comments or suggestions that the respondent wished to contribute; and
- Whether the PAC process has enhanced their understanding of the project.

A copy of the online survey is provided in Appendix 5. It was available on the website during the consultation period and provided in hard copy, upon request.

The engagement process referred to previously in Sections 4.2.5 and 4.2.6 also provided an avenue for direct feedback from those taking part in the consultation process.



# 5 COMMUNITY RESPONSE TO PAC

# 5.1 Summary of Engagement

# 5.1.1 Website Activity

Attendance on the webpage was recorded on the basis of users visiting the site. A total of 406 page visits were recorded between 4<sup>th</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup> January.

# 5.1.2 Website Feedback

All formal responses to the consultation process were provided through completing online survey forms, emailing a member of the development team directly or through verbal communication by contacting a member of the development team via telephone.

A total of 15 survey forms were returned over the course of the consultation. An overview of the completed survey form responses is included at Appendix 6 for reference.

In terms of additional feedback received via the website, two emails were received; one from Ednie Farms who are developing a project locally and another from a local resident seeking additional information.

# 5.1.3 Issues emerging from PAC

The response from the PAC process demonstrated that 53% of respondents (8/15) considered the consultation process helped them to better understand the proposals for the site at Kirkton, with all respondents stating that they wish to be kept informed and updated on the process. All information received has been processed in line with current GDPR requirements.

Regarding the overall closed question regarding support for the proposed development, the following statistics were recorded:

Total respondents: 15
Respondents in Favour: 2
Respondents in Opposition: 13
Respondents Undecided: 0

When asked what they would change about the proposals, the comments received noted the following:

- The location of the proposal on the lands;
- The siting and proximity of the panels in relation to residential properties;
- Visual impact; and
- Size of the proposal.

The main issues raised via the online webpage, over email and via telephone are summarised in the response summary at Table 5.1 overleaf.

### 5.1.4 Additional Feedback

As stated in Section 4.2.5, a number of local residents also availed of the opportunity to engage directly with the Client and their appointed team. A summary of this engagement is provided in Table 5.1 below.

### **Email correspondence**

Political Reps and MSP (Cllr Allan; Cllr Beagrie; Cllr Sutherland; Cllr Buchan and Stewart Stevenson MSP) Email correspondence issued 02.12.2020 and further contact made January 2021 via follow up email and direct telephone calls

- RPS issued an initial request for engagement email to all Councillors in December 2020;
- RPS issued a further email in January 2021 confirming the initial email that was sent/RPS made direct contact via telephone;
- Responses were recevied from Cllr Allan; Cllr Beagrie and Cllr Sutherland. Cllr Beagrie and Cllr Allan confirmed that they had received the information however they were on the Buchan Area Committee and did not wish to engage further in regards to the proposals. This was noted and no further contact was made. No response was recevied from Cllr Buchan;
- A response was received from Stewart Stevenson MSP to confirm receipt of the request for engagement. Mr Stevenson stated that he had received the letter and queried whether the proposal was related the the Energy application at Kirkton. RPS responded to provide Mr Stevenson with further details of the application including a link to the project website and confirmed that the current proposals were entirely separate.

Resident Kirktion North (Via E-Mail Correspondence)

Further to receipt of the letter referred to in Section 4.2.5 of this Report, the owners of Kirkton North contacted RPS and Elgin to advise of their opposition to the project noting a number of specific concerns. The residents advised that they did not wish to take up the offer of a phone/video call to discuss concerns but rather preferred to have all correspondence in writing.

- RPS responded to advise the residents of the present project stage ie that at the time of correspondence assessments remained ongoing to inform emerging development proposals. RPS/Elgin noted the resident's position ie not to engage via phone/video call and their stated opposition to the project. It was reiterated that the offer of diect engagement and correspondence remained should they change their view regarding this.
- Notwithstanding the above, the layout of the project emerged to offset any potential impacts on the residents of North Kirkton through; Exclusion of a field directly south of the property from any development proposals at project outset and implementation of substantial panel set backs to the north, northeast and west of the property.

Three Local Residents (Via E-Mail residents contacted correspondence)

Three further local residents contacted project team direct

residents contacted the project team directly to ask for clarifications on the project and raise queries. Two of these people raised queries on foot of the Elain presentation to the Buchan East Community Council meeting. The third query emerged as the person had became aware of the project through the general consultation process. Queries raised included: - Lack of a consultation open day or consultation with St Fergus; - Approach to seek consent via the Scottish

Responses were issued to each of the respondant's to address their queries. Where repeat e-mails emerged these were respondened to also. Elgin/RPS advised inter-alia:

- That the project was supported by a PAC process tailored to take account of the pandemic and the circumstances surrounding it;
- That given the circumstances an open day couldn't occur;
- That proposals were not fixed at that time and that assessments and feedback received through the consultation process would in turn inform proposals;

A total of 15 feedback forms were completed, which included the following feedback: -

- 13 of 15 respondents stated they were opposed or very opposed to the scheme proposals;
- 3 out of 15 respondents stated they lived within 5km of the project:
- Of the fifteen responses received the following specific queries about the effects of the project: -
  - A number of local residents raised concerns about the cumulative impact of the development alongside a number of other local developments in the wider area (citing local gas plant) and the impact the development would have in terms of visual amenity and the impact upon the coastal zone:
  - Other local residents stated that they had concerns about the size and scale of the development adjacent to their residential property and the amount of development that they would be surrounded by;
  - A number of other respondents raised concerns regarding the effect on local environment and wildlife in the area, particularly migrating birds;
  - One resident had concerns regarding the economic impact upon house values in the area;
  - Two respondents stated they did not have any concerns.

# 5.1.5 Addressing issues which emerged through the PAC process

As set out previously within this Report, direct correspondence took place with various members of the public living within the immediate vicinity of the site, and other interested parties including Buchan East Community Council helped garner additional feedback on the scheme and highlight any issues prior to submission of the application to the ECU.

The applicant team responded to all of these queries either directly via email and telephone over the course of the consultation period or as and when emails were received after the consultation period ended. The applicant team addressed all queries raised by confirming the level of technical information that would be submitted with the application to alleviate any concerns raised regarding environmental issues such as the level of traffic associated with the development, impacts upon local wildlife and potential amenity/visual issues regarding the scheme.



The detailed design of the proposed solar farm and energy storage facility has evolved having due regard to the comments received during this consultation process and to take account of emerging survey information or that received from statutory authorities as part of the planning lead in.

A tailored package of environmental assessments were also undertaken to supplement the planning application, to set out the likely impacts of proposals and to inform on any mitigation to reduce and/or prevent negative impacts where identified.

Table 5.2 overleaf confirms key issues raised, and the applicant approach to considering and addressing same.

As set out in Table 5.1 above, a number of other issues were raised directly with the Applicant and RPS during the process. All emerging issues were addressed through discussion and e-mail correspondence with those persons.

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# 6 CONCLUSION

# 6.1 Meaningful Pre-Application Consultation

This report demonstrates that the applicant, Elgin Energy EsCo Ltd, has undertaken a meaningful and effective voluntary period of Pre-Application Consultation in relation to the proposed development for an electricity generating station with installed capacity in excess of 50 megawatts (MW) consisting of a solar PV farm of approximately 50MW capacity and an energy storage facility of approximately 20MW capacity, with ancillary development on lands on lands approximately 1.2km southeast of St.Fergus Village, Peterhead, directly east of the A90.

Due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, the Scottish Government introduced temporary emergency legislation and guidance on how Applicant's should conduct appropriate and meaningful PAC to ensure applications and the development management process was able to continue during this period.

The Applicant undertook an extensive 10 week period of engagement with stakeholders, including local elected reps in the vicinity of the application site from December 2020 - February 2021, and the local community between 4<sup>th</sup> January and 29<sup>th</sup> January 2021. The Applicant provided a dedicated project website which was live for a period exceeding 3 weeks and which remains in place, undertook a letter-drop to local residents within the immediate vicinity of the site and contacted the local Community Council and elected representatives to engage. The engagement with the community has been appropriate, in line with the proposals, and is ongoing throughout the pre-application period. The project team has provided stakeholders with up-to-date and accurate information enabling them to actively engage and provide feedback to the applicant before any scheme is submitted to the ECU for consent.

Whilst the formal PAC peiod ended on 29<sup>th</sup> January 2021 Elgin Energy has remained receptive to engagement in the intervening period. Furthermore, Elgin Energy is fully committed to maintaining that engagement throughout the delivery of the project.

# SeaFit to ensure the health of fishermen

A project dedicated to the wellbeing of fishermen, former fishermen and their families around the northeast has been launched in a first for Scotland.

Working at sea is one of the most challenging jobs in the UK so getting fit and healthy and staying that way can be difficult.

Live Life Aberdeenshire is working in partnership with the Fishermen's Mission and Seafarer's Hospital Society, supported by Seafarers UK, to deliver the SeaFit Programme.

A UK-wide initiative, its aim is to deliver sustainable improvements to the mental and physical health and wellbeing of active and retired fishermen and their families.

Live Life Aberdeenshire has employed a Healthy Lifestyle Advisor to work directly with local fishing communities in the delivery of the programme.

Catriona Arthur will work with fishermen and their families in and around the harbours of Peterhead, Fraserburgh and Aberdeen, raising awareness of and providing advice and support on a variety of health and wellbeing matters to improve long term health.

Her role is to support mental and physical health improvements and to ensure there is availability for appropriate treatment, resources and help both at the harbourside and within the local community.

This includes mental wellbeing, physical activity, eating well and maintaining a healthy weight, support to stop smoking, dental health and advice about alcohol, drugs, and sexual health.

Catriona said: "The principle aim of the SeaFit Programme is to help fishermen and their families live healthier, more independent and more active lives.

"My role will involve connecting with and referring to

health and wellbeing services and healthcare professionals within the local community and in time providing some of this support at harbourside.

"A key part of my role is to be available within the communities themselves, to build relationships and trust and it's really important that anyone who feels they could benefit from this service feels able to contact me and speak to me in confidence."

UK SeaFit Project Delivery Manager, Carol Elliott, added: "Fishing remains the UK's most dangerous profession and life is tough for many of our fishermen at present.

"The SeaFit Programme was set up because it had been identified that fishermen find it difficult to make and keep pre-booked health appointments.

"They can't plan for time off because the weather, tides and fish locations often dictate when they need to be out at sea.






# **Project overview**

The proposed site is in Kirkton, Aberdeenshire, AB42 3PD. It is approximately 1.2 kilometres south east of St Fergus village and due east of the A90, Peterhead. Access to the site will be from the A90.

The proposed project covers approximately 260 acres and will accommodate approximately 35 megawatts (MW) of ground mounted solar photovoltaic (PV) panels and a 20MW energy storage facility. A project lifetime of 40 years is proposed.

The proposed solar farm will generate approximately 37,000,000 kilowatt hours (kWh) per annum powering 10,500 homes or 14,000 electric vehicles (EVs) every year.



# Local engagement

Elgin Energy EsCo Ltd is committed to the local communities in which we operate. We engage with communities on each project through a public consultation and try to identify local initiatives that we can support through a community benefit fund.

Local contractors and businesses will be engaged as far as possible during the installation phase. It is estimated that installation will take approximately 16 weeks. For the operational phase it is envisaged that local contractors and service providers will be engaged to maintain the solar farm.

# Pre-planning process

A number of assessments are being conducted to establish any potential affects of the proposed development on the site and surrounding lands. These reports include ecology, archaeology & cultural heritage, construction access & traffic and flood risk. In addition, a landscape and visual impact assessment has been undertaken to identify any impacts on nearby viewpoints. These viewpoints and the proposed site layout can be viewed on the project website. A glint & glare assessment is also carried out although glint & glare effects from PV panels are rare as they are designed to absorb, not reflect, sunlight. This is evidenced by the installation of PV panels adjacent to the runways at Gatwick airport.

Existing field boundaries, trees, and hedgerows will be retained as far as possible. The provision of bird boxes, insect hotels, and wildflower meadows provide significant opportunities for biodiversity enhancements. Once the solar farm is operational, sheep farming can take place ensuring the land remains in agricultural use.

# Physical elements of the development

The following components are proposed for this development:

- Solar panels will be arranged in rows facing southwards at an inclination of typically 25 degrees. The distance between the rows will be between 2–6 metres (m). The panels are set at 0.8m above ground level and increase to 2.8 3m approximately.
- A mounting system comprising upright galvanised steel posts which are screwed or pushed into the ground and an aluminium support frame which is bolted together.
- Inverters measuring approximately 7m x 2.5m x 3m high. They convert the DC electricty produced by the panels into grid-compatible AC current. They will be located throughout the site.
- A primary substation
- Energy storage facility
- Underground cabling from the panels/inverters to the substation
- Several permeable stone tracks to facilitate access to the inverters
- Rural 'timber & post' deer fence measuring 2.4m in height will enclose the site. A gap of 10cm at ground level will allow ecology to freely enter and exit.
- 3m high pole-mounted CCTV cameras inside the site to monitor the solar farm.

The solar farm requires no concrete foundations except for the substation bases. It is designed to be reversible and leave no trace when removed.




